A Word to Students



1. They should take good care of their health and be robust and strong.
2. They should always be friendly with others in the school and outside.
3. They should avoid vulgarity in their talk and behaviour.
4. They should accept whatever work is assigned to them as their rightful share. They should face difficulties courageously.
5. They should always be ready to lend a helping hand at home to their parents, brothers and sisters and in school to teachers and companions and any unattended visitor they happen to meet on the school premises.
6. They should never cheat or be unfair at play.
7. They should stand up when a teacher or a visitor comes to talk to them.
8. They should adhere to truth at any cost.
9. They should never be cruel. They must know that cruelty is the trait of a bully while kindness is the mark of a gentleman.
10. They should respect the beauty of the classroom and the school premises and report any damage they may observe.
11. They should never hesitate to say 'no' when asked or tempted to do a thing which they know to be wrong.
12. They should respect the liberty and the rights of others.
13. Instead of lamenting and grumbling over the evils of the world, they should try to contribute their share in making it better.
14. They should not waste their time in idle gossip.
15. They should take pride in wearing the school uniform.
16. They should look upon people from all parts of the world as their brothers/sisters irrespective of their colour and creed.



General Guidelines for parents

1. Parents entering class rooms to see their children or teachers during school hours is strictly prohibited. They will meet the teachers at the reception only when required. Prior intimation through the Diary is appreciated.
2. Parents are requested to inform the school if there is any change in their address/telephone numbers.
3. Half day / short leave should not be asked for security reasons. In an emergency, written permission must be taken from the Principal. The child will be allowed to go home only with the parents/guardians.
4. Application should be addressed to the Principal through the class teacher.
5. Parents should sign the progress report within three days of its distribution.
6. Students who come to school under the care of attendants should not leave the school before the attendants arrive. In case of delay, they should report to the school office.
7. The name, class and section of pupils should be clearly marked on their belongings. Blazer, coat and jersey should also bear the name of the student.
8. A student returning to school after suffering from an infection or contagious disease should produce a Medical Fitness Certificate.
9. Attention of parents is drawn to the fact that criticism of the teacher or school in the presence of their children should be scrupulously avoided because it results in losing respect for their teacher, with the consequent failure to learn from them. It further retards his/her progress.
10. Parents are advised not to deposit the tuition fee through their wards.
11. Students must come in proper school uniform.
12. Parents - teacher meeting will be conducted on last Saturday of every month.

Parent/guardians are required to attend the meeting compulsory and know about the progress of their wards.



SCHOOL RULES



1. Students should reach school before the school starts .
2. Bells are to be followed meticulously ensuring promptness and silence.
3. Change of class rooms between periods should be done in silence and in an orderly manner.
4. Students should be habitually clean and always neatly dressed. The school uniform should be worn on all working days and for all school functions.
5. Non-Sikh boys should get their hair cut decently (hair length be proportionate) keeping the decorum of a school in mind. Indecency will invite suspension without any prior warning.
6. No shouting or whistling is allowed in or around the school building. Running on corridors is strictly prohibited.
7. It is strictly forbidden to throw anything on anyone.
8. Care must be taken of all school property and no student should disfigure or spoil any school furniture or the walls in any way. Damaging others' belonging will not be condoned. All intentional damages will have to be borne by the student concerned.
9. Students are not allowed to bring any sharp instruments, stickers, comb, CD, Floppy, Pen drive, Cards, Photographs, etc. to school.
10. No books, (other than text books or library books) magazines or papers may be brought to the school without the Principal's permission.
11. Lending or borrowing money or other articles is not permitted.
12. The school is not responsible for articles lost. It is not advisable to bring valuable articles (like expensive watches or fountain pens, calculators) to school. Parents are to be judicious in matters concerning money.
13. Our students should observe polite manners. Wherever they go, they should greet their teachers when they meet them. Bullying and use of foul language are punishable offences.
14. The school reserves its right to terminate the students with unsatisfactory progress in studies or whose conduct is a bad precept for others.



15. Firing crackers or splashing colours during Diwali/Holi in the school premises is strictly forbidden. Non-compliance with these instructions can result in the expulsion of the student from the school.
16. Meeting wards/ Teachers during school hours is to be done with the permission of the Principal only.
17. Students should get the progress report signed from the parents within three days of its distribution.
18. All students are to inculcate good habits of brushing their teeth, polishing shoes, pruning nails etc.
19. Students are not allowed to come to school by self driven automobiles.
20. Students must attend school in uniform .
21. Photographs of students must be in uniform for all purposes .
22. A student is allowed to go out of the school campus during school hours/school functions only with the written permission of the principal.



SCHOOL LIBRARY RULES



1. Students will be issued books through Library software.
2. Students are not allowed to carry their personal books into the library. However, one diary or a note-book is allowed.
3. They must maintain silence in the library.
4. Students can take the books for reading from the open racks and must place the books at the proper place after reading.
5. Books are issued to students for 14 days only.
6. Students can borrow using their I- cards only.
7. Books issued can be recalled at any time if necessary.
8. Only one book will be issued to a student at a time.
9. Book may be renewed as per the discretion of the librarian.
10. Books lost, torn, defaced, marked or damaged in any way will have to be replaced by borrowers.
11. A fine of Rs. 1 per day will be charged if not returned by the due date.





Rules for Inter House Competitions



1. A student of senior, sub-senior, junior group can take part in two individual competitions, two group competitions, any number of open competitions and sports.
2. (I) There will be no provisions of prizes for less than 05 participants in an event.
(ii) There will be 01 winner prize for 10 participants, 02 winners prize for 10-20 participants and 03 winner prizes for more than 20 participants.
3. A student can take part either in English or Hindi Competitions related to Debate, Speech, Quiz and poetry recitation/writing.
4. Topic/Theme for Hindi and English debate, speech, art & painting. Poster making will be announced a week before the scheduled competition.
5. Drawing Sheet and writing papers will be provided by the school for the respective competitions and the students should arrange other required materials.
6. Selection of song for Group song should be Motivational, Devotional patriotic or as per theme.
7. Selection of song for Group Dance competitions should be Devotional or folk-based and if it is western it should be decent and presentable.
8. Collection of names, selection of students and practice will be done as per time allotted for the same.
9. All students are advised to take part in all open house competitions, sports and screening rounds of other competitions.
10. The details related to the competitions will be informed to the students by their concerned House In-charges.
11. As per requirement of school, programs can be preponed or postponed.
12. All House masters/Associate House Masters are responsible and accountable for selection and registration of the name of participants of their respective houses.
13. All competitions the judges' decision will be accepted unanimously.
All participants, HM/AHM are expected to cooperate for the smooth organization of CCA competitions session 2025-2026.

NORMS OF PROMOTION AND ASSESSMENT SCHEME
FOR Classes III to VII

1. As per NEP 2020, the fundamental need is to evaluate higher order skills, such as analysis, critical thinking and conceptual clarity. There has been a shift from 'content- based' assessment to 'competency based' assessment as well as emphasis is on continuous assessment of overall growth and development – physical, mental, social, emotional and spiritual of the learner.
2. Evaluation is an integral part of teaching – learning process. In this a teacher will adhere to the following steps.
 - ✍ Set up the learning objectives.
 - ✍ Plan out the activities to meet the learning objectives.
 - ✍ Carry out the activities.
 - ✍ Evaluate the learning outcome.
3. All students of III to VII will be evaluated and assessed throughout the session in Scholastic and Co-Scholastic areas.
4. There will be two TERMS in an academic Year. Each term will be of six month.
5. In various classes , the syllabus will be as per the following scheme:

Classes – 3th, 4th and 5th	Term 1 – 50% syllabus Term 2 – 50% syllabus
Class- 6th	Term 1 – 50% syllabus Term 2 – 50% syllabus + 20% syllabus of Term 1 (topics relevant for the next grade)
Class -7th	Term 1 – 50% syllabus Term 2 – 50% syllabus + 30% syllabus of Term 1 (topics relevant for the next grade)

6. Scholastic Assessment will be done in two ways and will carry the following weight age in each term:

7. Pen Paper Test will include Very Short Answer type Questions(VSA), Short Answer Type (SA), Long Answer Type (LA), Case Study Based Questions, Lower Order thinking skills (LOTs) and Higher Order Thinking Skills (HOTs).

8. For Internal Assessment in each Term various activities and projects will be designed by the teachers in each subject to assess the core competencies acquired by the students. It is mandatory for the students to participate in all activities and projects to secure marks in Internal Assessment.

30 marks of Internal Assessment in each Term will cover assessment of following competencies:

In Languages – Listening and Speaking Skill -10marks; Reading skill - 5marks; Writing and Language Conventions -5 marks; Portfolio -5 marks; project 5 marks.

In other Subjects- Critical Thinking and Evaluation – 5 marks, Problem Solving & Inference -5marks, Collaboration and creative thinking -5 marks, Value/ Ethical Application of concepts – 5marks, Project & Viva – 5marks and Portfolio – 5 marks.

FOR CLASS VIII, IX & X

1. All students of VIII to X will be evaluated and assessed throughout the session in Scholastic and Co-Scholastic areas.
2. There will be two TERMS in an academic Year. Each term will be of six month.
3. Each Term will carry the syllabus as per the following scheme

TERM 1 - **60% syllabus**
TERM 2 - **100% syllabus**

4. Scholastic Assessment will be done in two ways and will carry the following weight age in each term:

5. Pen Paper Test will include Very Short Answer type Questions(VSA), Short Answer Type (SA), Long Answer Type (LA), Case Study Based Questions, Lower Order thinking skills (LOTs) and Higher Order Thinking Skills (HOTs).

For Internal Assessment in each Term various activities and projects will be designed by the teachers in each subject to assess the core competencies acquired by the students. It is mandatory for the students to participate in all activities and projects to secure marks in Internal Assessment.



20 marks of Internal Assessment in each Term will cover
Periodic test – 5 marks, Multiple Assessment -5 marks, Subject Enrichment-5marks and Portfolio – 5 marks.

6. The Student has to score minimum of 33% marks in PEN PAPER TEST and minimum of 33% marks in INTERNAL ASSESSMENT in each and every subject for promotion to next class.
7. In class IX if a student is unable to score 33% marks in Theory/ Internal Assessment in any **Two** subjects then he/she will be eligible for **RETEST**. A student who fails to score 33% marks in RETEST also, will not be promoted to next higher class. For class X provision of CBSE BOARDS will be applicable.
8. DAV CAE will conduct year end annual exam for Class - VIII.

FOR CLASS XI & XII

1. Directives and Provisions of CBSE will be applicable for the students of XI and XII.
2. During the year there will be :
Three Unit Tests of 25 marks each,
Half Yearly exam of 100 marks and will cover 60% syllabus
ANNUAL EXAM (for Class XI) / Two Pre Boards (for Class XII) of 100 marks and will cover 100% syllabus.

MARK DISTRIBUTION WILL BE

In Science - 70 marks Theory written and 30 marks Practical
In Commerce - 80 marks Theory written and 20 marks Practical

3. Every student has to appear and obtain 33% marks in Theory and Practical separately in each examination to qualify the exam.
4. If a student is unable to score 33% marks in Theory/Practical in any **ONE** subject, he/she will be eligible for **RETEST**. A child who fails to score 33% marks in RETEST also, will not be promoted to next higher class.



5. Final Result of STD. XI will be prepared as per the weight age given below:

UNIT TEST – 10% HALF YEARLY – 30% Annual EXAM – 60%

6. To be promoted to the next class student must score at least 33% in each subject in **final examination and in the cumulative score.**
7. DAV CAE will conduct year end annual exam for class XI.

: NOTE :

1. No Periodic / Unit Test or any Subjective Internal Assessment/ Practical's will be conducted before or after the scheduled date.
2. It is compulsory for students to appear in all TESTS and ASSESSMENTS. In case of absence in any Test / Examination student will be awarded zero in the concerned subject.
3. Any change in schedule will be intimated to the students through a circular.
4. Every month 75% class attendance is compulsory for the student to get promoted to the next class.
5. Mass absence of students before any Examination / Tests would entail loss of marks in the compulsory subjects for each day of absence.
6. Students who restore to malpractice in any of the Examination/ Tests will be awarded **zero** in the concerned subject and may be debarred from appearing in the rest of the Examinations / Tests. This may even lead to the dismissal of the student from the school.
7. Syllabus will be completed well in advance and time will be allotted for proper revision before the Exams.
8. Students will be given monthly Assignments by the concerned subject teachers every month in the last week of the month, which should be submitted in the first week of succeeding month.
9. Project work will be given twice in the entire session and it is evaluative in nature.
10. Marks and percentage will be reflected in the Report Book/ Progress Report as per the latest DAV CAE / CBSE norms.
11. Annual Result will be declared during the 3rd / 4th week of March.
